OBRA Office to Launch New Level I Screening Form in December 2012 – Webinar Planned for November 14

Editor's note: The following article was provided by Angela Howard from the OBRA Screening Office at the Alabama Dept. of Mental Health.

On December 1, 2012, the OBRA PASRR Office is slated to launch a new LTC-14 Form, more commonly known as the Level I Screening Form. Prior to the launch, in association with the Alabama Nursing Home Association, **the OBRA Office will offer a webinar on Wednesday, November 14, 2012, to introduce the new form.** The webinar is scheduled from 10:30 a.m. - 11:30 a.m. It will highlight changes, provide guidance on user navigation and offer an opportunity to ask questions. Registration is limited to 100 lines. Please note that this webinar will be recorded and available through ANHA's website as well as the OBRA website. Registration is free, and no CEUs will be provided.

The new Level I Form has been specially designed to facilitate the admission and continued residence of persons in Medicaid certified facilities. Before we created a final product, we solicited the support of the nursing home and hospital community. From this assembly, we selected a PASRR Focus Group to review the proposed form and provide feedback. The invaluable feedback allowed us to modify the form in a manner that benefits PASRR stakeholders and develop a document that is both comprehensive and user friendly.

The new Level I Form showcases valuable technical prompts that assist the user in completing the form, which minimizes the need for substantial technical assistance. Some of the prompts we provide relate to PRN medications, situational diagnoses, dementia and seizure disorder. Also, the form includes the following diagnoses: obsessive compulsive disorder, post traumatic stress disorder, panic disorder, schizoaffective disorder and somatoform disorder. Additionally, the language on the form supports Rosa's Law and intellectual disability advocates by removing the term "mental retardation" and any associated acronyms and replacing it with "intellectual disability."

From a computer technology standpoint, the form is easier to navigate. OBRA PASRR's data management team will begin implementing the new system on Friday, November 30, 2012, at

4:00 p.m. Therefore, if you need a Level I determination prior to 5:00 p.m. on this date, ensure that the OBRA Office receives your Level I by 3:00 p.m. The new Level I computer-based system will be fully operational on Saturday, December 1, 2012. It will allow you to utilize your same user ID and password.

Election Alert and Call to Action

Editor’s Note: The following is an excerpt of ANHA President Eddie Jackson’s memo to the membership from October 24.

I’m sure all of you recognize that Tuesday, November 6 is Election Day and we will be voting on offices all the way from the Presidency of the United States to offices in our local courthouses. But there are some other issues on the ballot that deserve our attention.

There are 11 amendments on the ballot and I want to draw your attention to Amendment 2. This amendment authorizes the refinancing of economic development bonds and with its passage Alabama will have about \$160 million dollars to use for economic development incentives. These incentives will help bring new jobs to our state and help keep jobs we already have. Amendment 2 makes this money available without either increasing the state’s debt limit or increasing taxes.

Our Association leadership have been asked by Governor Bentley to help promote passage of Amendment 2 and we have agreed to urge our members to help turn out the vote for this effort. You should have received from the Association office posters and a sample ballot that helps people understand where to find the amendments on Election Day. We have been asked by the Alabama Education Association to distribute a sample ballot on Amendment 4. While the Alabama Nursing Home Association is taking no official position on this issue, we do believe we should assist AEA in the distribution of this material. Amendment 4 is the amendment that supporters say will remove racist language from Alabama’s Constitution. While this would seem to be a very worthy goal, AEA’s lawyers and others say the amendment would also eliminate from the constitution language that guarantees the right to an education in Alabama. We would appreciate you distributing to employees the AEA material you should have received. Please remember that AEA played a major role in passage of the September 18 amendment that help secure funding for the state’s General Fund and the Medicaid budget.

One election day, please help facilitate voting for employees and residents. If you have any questions regarding Get-Out-The-Vote efforts or the election, please call the Association office and we will help in any way possible.

Medication Administration

ANHA has been in contact with the Alabama Board of Pharmacy as well as the Alabama Board of Nursing in regards to the handling of medication passes when a resident is scheduled to be out of the facility on a day pass or therapeutic leave (with physician's approval and knowledge). Listed below is a suggested policy.

Suggested Model Policy:

1. The nurse provides the resident or family member with the doses of oral medications to cover the time the resident is to be on day-pass or therapeutic leave. Each dose would be placed in a marked envelope showing the medication, dose time, procedure for administering (e.g., with food or before or after eating). Instructions for giving the medication(s) to the resident are provided both verbally and in writing to the resident/responsible party.
2. The nurse documents on the resident's record that the resident has received a supply of medication(s) to self-administer while on pass and documents on the Medication Administration Record "out on pass".

REMINDER: Survey Process Changes in Effect December 1!

As previously mentioned in the *Weekly Roundup*, The Centers for Medicare& Medicaid Services (CMS) has issued a series of survey and certification memorandums that will become effective December 1, 2012. All facilities are encouraged to download and review these new changes. ANHA has prepared a brief summary of the Survey Process changes to Appendix P. *Attached is a summary as well as a copy of the new CMS-802 and CMS-672 that will be used beginning December 1.* A link to obtain a copy of the CMS memorandums regarding the F tag changes as well as the survey changes are listed below. The links include not only the changes, but surveyor training tools as well.

CMS Issues Survey & Certification Memorandum on F tag 155 – Advance Directives (Advanced Copy) - The Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services made changes to surveyor guidance for Advance Directives in Appendix PP of the SOM to provide clarification to nursing home surveyors when determining compliance with the regulatory requirements for Advance Directives. The regulatory language remains unchanged. The revisions to the Surveyor Guidance at F tag 155 in Appendix PP of the SOM include resident’s rights to: Establish Advance Directives; and Accept or decline treatments. . The revisions should be implemented no later than November 30, 2012. CMS Issues Survey & Certification Memorandum on F tag 322 – Feeding Tubes (Advance Copy) - The Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services made revisions to interpretive guidelines for Feeding Tubes in Appendix PP of the SOM to provide clarification to nursing home surveyors when determining compliance with the regulatory requirements for feeding tubes. The regulatory language will remain unchanged. CMS deleted F tag 321 which contained language about not using feeding tubes unless unavoidable, and incorporated the guidance into F tag 322. . The revisions should be implemented no later than November 30, 2012. CMS Issues Survey & Certification Memorandum on Advanced Copy – Revisions to State Operations Manual (SOM), Appendix P – Traditional Survey Protocol for Long Term Care (LTC) Facilities and Chapter 9/Exhibits including Survey Forms 672, 802, 802S and 802P - The Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services has updated Appendix P of the State Operations Manual as well as Exhibits as part of Chapter 9. Survey Protocols for LTC Facilities have been revised for the Traditional Survey process Tasks 1-5C to reflect changes for the Minimum Data Set (MDS) 3.0; New Quality Measures (QM) Reports; Revised CMS forms 672 and 802, 802S and 802P; and Sampling and reviewing residents receiving psychopharmacological medications, specifically antipsychotic medications. Revisions to Chapter 9 of the SOM include various Exhibits including survey forms that have been revised to accommodate changes for MDS 3.0 and the new QM Reports; and New QM Reports available for use in the Traditional Survey Process. . Health Care Joint Commission Article Calls OSHA 300: A Log to Live By

The OSHA 300 form is explained and praised as a valuable analytical tool to protect health care workers in a recent article published by Joint Commission Resources. In its October article, "OSHA 300: A Log to Live By," the Joint Commission states that "properly documenting work-related injuries can reduce incidents" of worker injuries and illnesses." OSHA and the Joint Commission have worked together since 2004 under an Alliance agreement to protect health care workers' health and safety. *Please see the attached article on how to make the best use of the OSHA 300 Log.*

Infection Control Update

The Society for Healthcare Epidemiology of America (SHEA) and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) have each released new tools and information to help track deadly healthcare-associated infections (HAIs) in nursing homes and other long term care settings. Published online recently in *Infection Control and Hospital Epidemiology*, the journal of SHEA, an expert panel published updated infection definitions and guidance that provides uniform criteria for nursing homes and other long term care facilities to track and monitor HAIs. The updated surveillance definitions, coordinated by SHEA's Long Term Care Special Interest Group, incorporate evidence published over the past two decades, with definitions for norovirus gastroenteritis and *Clostridium difficile* infections added and more specific definitions for urinary tract infections included.

In parallel, CDC's National Healthcare Safety Network (NHSN) released a new tracking component, allowing nursing homes and other long term care facilities to monitor HAIs. The newly published guidance serves as the foundation of the new NHSN component. When facilities track infections, they can identify problems, implement prevention measures, and monitor progress toward stopping infections. State and local health officials can also use the system to monitor the impact of regional prevention efforts. On the national level, data entered into NHSN will gauge progress toward national infection prevention goals.

The new NHSN component allows nursing homes and other long term care facilities to track *Clostridium difficile* (a deadly diarrheal infection), drug-resistant infections such as methicillin-resistant *Staphylococcus aureus* (MRSA), urinary tract infections, and healthcare worker adherence to basic infection control procedures including hand hygiene and glove use.

CDC is one of multiple federal agencies vigorously working to protect patients. The Department of Health and Human Services has released a National Action Plan to Prevent Healthcare-Associated Infections with several goals to address infections among nursing home residents including reducing catheter-associated urinary tract infections and infections from *Clostridium difficile*.

The new surveillance guidance has been endorsed by the American Medical Directors Association, the Association of Medical Microbiology and Infectious Disease-Canada, the Association for Professionals in Infection Control and Epidemiology, the Community and Hospital Infection Control Association-Canada, and the National Association of Directors of Nursing Administration in Long Term Care.

Hand Hygiene Key to Reducing MRSA

According to an article appearing in the October 25, 2012 FierceHealthcare.com e-newsletter, using proper hand hygiene, alone, can reduce *methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus* (MRSA) infections more effectively than isolating patients. Currently, hand-hygiene compliance amongst healthcare workers remains poor, with compliance levels reported at 25-40%. However, a nine-year study, conducted by researchers from University College London and called the Feedback Intervention Trial (FIT), that involved giving healthcare professionals one-on-one feedback on hand hygiene, found that the feedback approach made the healthcare workers twice as likely to wash their hands. The project, involved 16 hospitals and 44 Acute Care of the Elderly (ACE) wards. The FIT approach using both feedback and personalized action planning improved hand-hygiene compliance by up to 18 percent in intensive therapy units and 13 percent in elderly acute care wards. Soap use also increased by 30 percent. The project comprised of bedside placement of alcohol hand-rub, posters, patient empowerment materials encouraging healthcare workers to clean their hands, plus audit and feedback of hand-hygiene compliance at least once every 6 months. Researchers found that hand washing not only prevented MRSA, but other infections that are transmitted via contact.

OIG Releases 2013 Work Plan

The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), Office of Inspector General (OIG), has released its annual Work Plan for 2013. The Work Plan focuses on seven different areas including: Medicare Part A and Part B; Medicare Part C and Part D; Medicaid Reviews; Legal and Investigative Activities Related to Medicare and Medicaid; Public Health Review; Human Services Reviews; and Other HHS-Related Reviews. In each area, the Work Plan identifies compliance risk areas that subject Medicare and Medicaid providers to audit and enforcement initiatives. Under Medicare Part A and Part B, SNFs are specifically targeted and OIG plans follow-up reports in the following areas: Adverse Events in Post-Acute Care; Quality of Care Requirements; State Agency Verification of Corrections; Oversight of Poorly Performing Facilities; Use of Antipsychotic Drugs; Questionable Billing Patterns for Part B Services; and Oversight of the Minimum Data Set. Overall, OIG will continue its focus on reviewing potential areas to discover fraud, quality issues and costs. Ventlab Corporation Issues Nationwide Recall of its Manual Resuscitators

ANHA was notified this week that on July 11, 2012, Ventlab Corporation initiated a nationwide recall of 14,602 of its manual resuscitators. The recalled manual resuscitators have been found to potentially deliver little to no air/oxygen through the patient valve to the patient, which could result in life threatening health consequences that include hypoxia and hypoventilation.

End users who have manual resuscitators at the lot numbers *listed in the attachment* should stop using them and immediately contact Ventlab Corporation for further instructions on the return of these products. Recalled manual resuscitators were manufactured and distributed nationwide to distributors that sold and distributed products to hospitals, clinics and EMS units from March 2012 to July 2012. Products can be identified by the part number, description and lot number on case labels, as well as a small white label on the individual packaging bag.

FDA MedWatch - Ameridose, LLC: Recall of Unexpired Products in Circulation

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration announced today that Ameridose, LLC, based in Westborough, Mass., is voluntarily recalling all of its unexpired products in circulation. The FDA is currently conducting an inspection of Ameridose's facility. Although this inspection is ongoing, the FDA's preliminary findings have raised concerns about a lack of sterility assurance for products produced at and distributed by this facility. Use of non-sterile injectable products can represent a serious hazard to health that could lead to life-threatening injuries.

Products from Ameridose can be identified by markings that indicate Ameridose by name or by its company logo. A complete list of all products subject to this recall can be accessed at www.ameridose.com.

This recall is not based on reports of patients with infections associated with any of Ameridose's products, and the agency recommended this recall out of an abundance of caution. As new information becomes available, the FDA will issue additional public communications.

At this time, the FDA is recommending that health care professionals do not need to follow up with patients who received Ameridose products. Health care professionals should stop using Ameridose products at this time, and return them to the firm.
